March 01	Spring/Summer Exhibit "Celebrating Gardner's 100 Years as a City" no reservation needed In connection with Gardner's Centennial Celebrations, the museum will reopen after the winter break with an exciting exhibit showcasing long-term, still-existing businesses, and other memorable aspects of the city's first 100 years. The exhibit will run until August 27 th during regular museum opening hours.
March 16	Irish Step Dance 6:30-7:30 pm after a museum-hosted reception at 6 pm After a 3-year hiatus Anne O'Connell's Irish Step Dancers will be performing once again at the museum! Join us for a St. Patrick's Day celebration with a lively performance rooted in trad. Irish dance.
April 6	A Worcester County Civil War story in letters 7-8 pm after a museum-hosted recept. at 6:30 pm Jan Drake is a retired librarian and hobby genealogist who lives in Needham. Her great grandfather's cousin George W. Harwood from North Brookfield enlisted in the MA 36 th Regiment of Volunteers which served for three years (1862-1865), travelling with the Ninth Corps primarily under General Ambrose Burnside. He wrote home almost weekly from 9 states. The program includes reading from the letters, and maps and photos of people and places mentioned. Jan has published a book which provides context for George's letters. Signed copies of the book will be available for purchase.
April 13	The Heist 7-8 pm after a museum-hosted reception at 6:30 pm Retired corporate accountant Bob Ainsworth, the author of <i>Duped</i> , a fictional account of the still unsolved 1990 art heist at Boston's Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, will review the actual details of the theft, the suspects, and the motives behind the world's most valued art theft. April 20	Medieval West Afrika 7-8 pm after a museum-hosted reception at 6:30 pm The presentation "Going for the Gold: Art and Trade in Medieval West Africa" will give an overview of some of the major traditions of West African sculpture from the 10 th century CE to the 16 th century, with beautiful examples of art from Nigeria (Igbo-Ukwu, Ife, and Benin Kingdom) and Mali (Djenne). Dr. Jean M. Borgatti, Fulbright Scholar (2002-2003, 2014-2015), and Professor of Fine and Applied Arts at University of Benin - Nigeria (2013-2017), is a Visiting Scholar at Clark University and Boston University, and Consulting Curator for African, Oceanic, First Peoples' Art at Fitchburg Art Museum.

May 4	Living with Nature 7-8 pm after a museum-hosted reception at 6:30 pm Join Athol Bird & Nature Club president and Millers River Environmental Center director Dave Small as he explores the transformation of his yard from a boring suburban lot dominated by lawn to a rich habitat for our native wildlife. Removing invasive species, planting native plants, and providing water, food, and

cover for a variety of wildlife and people. The result is a space that has become a wonderful place to hang out, enjoying a wide variety of wildlife.

May 18	The Language of Icons: Art as Revelation 7-8 pm after a museum-hosted reception at 6:30 pm Dennis Sardella, docent at the Museum of Russian Icons in Clinton, will give an illustrated lecture about Byzantine and Russian icons, their history, symbolic language, and role in the liturgical and spiritual life of the Eastern Church.
