Local butterfly enthusiast Anne Gilmartin is dedicated to saving butterflies by having raised monarchs for about ten years, by monitoring populations, life cycles, and habitat, and by educating the community. Tonight, you will see and hold caterpillars at different stages, and chrysalises.
