\*\*The Levi Heywood Memorial Library Goes Fine Free: Fostering Equitable Access to Library Services\*\*

Gardner, MA, May 15, 2024 - The Levi Heywood Memorial Library is proud to announce that it is eliminating fines on overdue materials, effective immediately. This decision reflects a growing national trend towards promoting equitable access to library services and follows the lead of many public libraries across the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

"Libraries are community resources designed to serve everyone, regardless of their economic status," remarked Stephanie Young, Director of the Levi Heywood Memorial Library. "By going fine free, we are removing barriers to access and ensuring that all members of our community can benefit from the resources and services the library provides."

The move to eliminate fines aligns with the mission of libraries as stated by James Lonergan, Director of the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC), who emphasized the importance of providing equitable access to services. Research indicates that fines can deter individuals, particularly those facing economic challenges, from utilizing library resources. Furthermore, fines do not consistently ensure the return of library materials and can be perceived as a barrier to usage.

"Our decision to go fine free is rooted in our commitment to increasing access to the library," stated Stephanie Young. "We want to create a welcoming environment where everyone feels encouraged to explore, learn, and grow without the fear of financial penalties."

While the Levi Heywood Memorial Library will no longer charge fines on overdue materials, patrons will still be responsible for paying for lost or damaged items. Additionally, certain special collections, such as Museum Passes, may accrue fines for late returns to ensure equitable access for all patrons.

The CW MARS Automated Library Network, comprising 161 member libraries, voted to become fine free in 2022, underscoring the collective commitment to fostering accessibility and inclusivity within library communities. Over 91% of CW MARS libraries are currently fine free.

"We recognize that overdue fines can create economic barriers and perpetuate social inequities," remarked Jeanette Lundgren, Executive Director of CW MARS. "By reaching this milestone of 90% fine free libraries, we are taking a significant step towards making library services accessible to all members of our community."

The Library encourages patrons to take advantage of this opportunity to clear any existing fines and continue to utilize the library's resources to their fullest extent.
