The Connection

What is new is old? What is old is new?

In Ecclesiastes 1:9, we read, "What has been will be again, what has been done will be done again; there is nothing new under the sun." This invites us to consider the cyclical nature of ideas and wisdom throughout history. What is new often has roots in what is old, and what seems old can be revitalized and made new again.

As we stop and chat with each other before or after church or while working in the thrift shop, we often find ourselves lamenting about the uncertainty of our times. That "normal" rhythm of life has been disturbed. Ecclesiastes 1:9 reminds us that many of the challenges we face today are not new; they echo the struggles of those who came before us. The wisdom of our ancestors can guide us through modern dilemmas. We must not discard their teachings but rather embrace them, allowing their insights to inform our decisions today. We can find harmony in embracing both the wisdom of our past and the possibilities of our future.

In the parable in Luke 5:36-39 Jesus emphasizes the need for innovation. While we cherish our traditions, we must also be open to new ideas and methods. Just as new wine requires new wineskins, our faith must evolve to meet the needs of a changing world while continuing to stay rooted in the wisdom of the old. This call to embrace the new does not negate the old nor does the old negate the new. When we disregard the old, we risk losing the essence of what has been built over time. Instead, we should seek to allow the new to complement the old, to integrate the new with old, so creating a tapestry of wisdom with fresh expressions of faith that honors.

By recycling ideas, we can create a vibrant faith that honors tradition while welcoming innovation. We may feel compelled to pursue new ideas and innovations, but true renewal often comes from reimagining and revitalizing what already exists. God calls us to take the old truths of His Word and apply them in fresh ways to meet the needs of our current generation. As we reflect on these truths, let us remember that in God's economy, what is new is often rooted in what is old. We are called to honor the wisdom of the past while embracing the newness that God brings into our lives. Let us be diligent in recycling ideas, integrating old truths with new insights, and allowing God's Spirit to guide us in this journey.





New Alarm System

As anyone who owns a home knows, maintenance and upgrading can be a slow process and it has been for us getting the new alarm system in place. But alas, it is done!

The old system was a heat sensing system and one of the difficulties was that with having cathedral ceilings in the fellowship hall and sanctuary, it wasn't as sensitive to alarm. The new system is a smoke detection system designed with the cathedral ceilings in mind.

In the sanctuary, monitoring for smoke is done with laser detection. It is nearly invisible and capable of monitoring the entire sanctuary. It is also very sensitive. The folks that put it in asked one day asked if our church services used incense as it seems the heavy use of incense at another church did set off the alarm startling all and creating some temporary chaos.

Please take a moment to walk the halls and the rooms to note where the fire boxes are in the building.
